AEC1131H-SV-6331 An Introduction to Research in Practice in Adult Literacy Instructor: Dr. Mary Norton. ON-line using OISE/UT's WebKF website.

Research-in-practice is literacy research conducted by or with people directly engaged in adult literacy teaching and learning. It is a powerful way for practitioners to reflect on their practice, develop their practice and contribute to the direction of the field. As a participant in this introductory course, you will learn about research in practice as you extend your knowledge about selected topics in adult literacy. As well as learning about research in practice initiatives in Canada and elsewhere, you will critically read and discuss research articles, relate research findings to your practice, and prepare to do a research in practice project. The course will introduce activities and various approaches to identify a research focus, clarify your perspectives, situate your research topic in local and larger contexts, involve participants, collect and analyse information, and write up and share what you learn. While addressed to adult literacy educators, the course may be of interest to others who want to use research to improve practice. Since the purpose of the course is to relate research and practice, it is important that participants are currently working or have recently worked in an adult literacy, adult education or related setting.

What Makes the Learner-Practitioner Relationship Work?

A group of practitioners in eastern Ontario formed a research-in-practice circle to investigate the learner-practitioner relationship and the "intangibles" in that relationship, which support learner progress. The idea began in a Resource Sharing meeting held by the Literacy Ontario Central South (LOCS). Practitioners from the various programs LOCS had brought together wanted to further investigate the learner-practitioner relationship.
